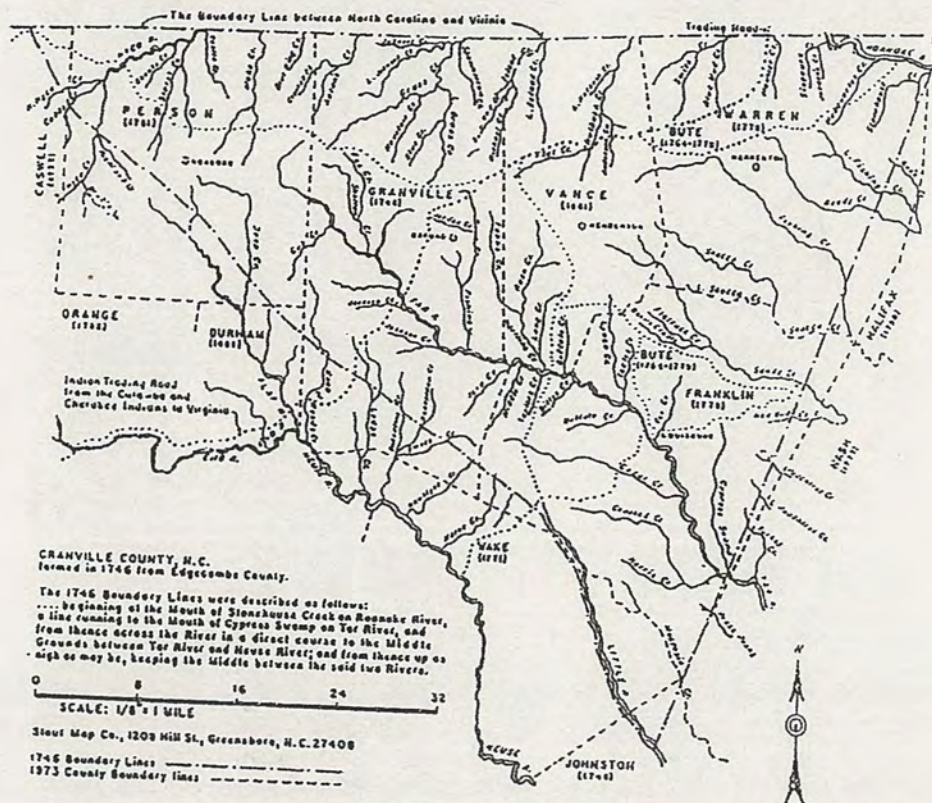

Order'd that Edward **CARY** an Aged and infirm person be recommended to the General Assembly of this Province as a proper person to be exempt from paying publick Taxes & Performing other publick Duties.

William **PARK** produced a power of Attorney from Robert **CRAWFORD**, Robert **McIntock** and C'o **MERCHANTS** to the said **PARK** which was proved by the Seal of the City of Glasgow & subscribed by the present Lord provost of the said City agreeable to an Act of parliament made in fifth year of King George the second. The said power being dated the 4th day of June 1767. Order'd that the said Power of Attorney be admitted to record.

A Deed of Bargain & Sale from William **MOORE** to Daniel **POTTER** for 400 acres dated the 7th of September 1767. Ack'd. – M.O.R.

Julius **NICHOLS** Esq'r produced a Commission from under the hand & seal of His Excellency the Governour dated the 19th day of May 1767 appointing him Sheriff for the County of Bute the ensuing Year; took the Oaths of Government subscribed the Test & took the Oath of a sheriff and enter'd into Bond with Benjamin **PERSON**, Thomas **BELL**, John **HAWKINS** & William **MOORE** securities approved of by the county..

Benjamin **PERSON** C. Sur: return'd a plan of an Acre of Land by him surveyed for Francis **MABRY** & Likewise an half acre of Land of John **GOLDEN** according to an order of last Court. – M.O.R.

The Baptist College
The Public Ledger, November 21, 1891

We are more than glad to see that our people have fully awakened to the importance of trying to secure the establishment of the Baptist College in Oxford. A large and enthusiastic meeting was held in the Opera House Friday evening to consider the matter.

Rev. C.A. **JENKINS** made a splendid speech full of good sense and sound reasoning showing the great and lasting benefit Oxford would derive from the establishment of this institution in our midst, which carried conviction to the large audience present.

Hon. R.W. **WINSTON** made a plain and practical speech, and urged the people not to allow this opportunity to pass as it would never be offered again.

Dr. R.H. **MARSH**, Rev. J.S. **HARDAWAY** and others, made some well timed remarks, urging the importance of immediate action upon the part of our citizens if they wish to secure the college.

The meeting actually got down to business and a considerable amount of money was raised in a short time.

We hope every one of our citizens will come up open handed and let us secure this grand institution for Oxford. We can do it if our people will pull together with the determination to win.

The Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC)

In 1933, Franklin Delano **ROOSEVELT**, after reading Professor William **JAMES'** essay of 1910 on the "Moral Equivalents of War" suggested the use of youth as an "army against nature." Also George H. **MAXWELL** (1915) wrote a book "Our National Defense - The Patriotism of Peace" advocating the use of the youth on big construction and reforestation projects - several European nations following WWI had set up youth labor camps. President Franklin Delano **ROOSEVELT** translated these facts from writings such as aforementioned into reality with the Civilian Conservation Corps, The WPA (Works Progress Administration) and others known by various names according to the work they furnished to help America through difficult times.

The camps were made up of young men who had no jobs, no money, no way to make a living and a lot of them were uneducated and without skills of any kind. The Camps were made from tents, barracks with bunks and the boys were issued clothing, shoes and other necessities. They all were given a "physical" and most of them had never been to a doctor. These young men were taught a skill, given food to eat, and paid a salary. They were paid \$30.00 a month of which all but \$5.00 was mailed to their parents for them to survive on. The work was hard and various. Most of the young men volunteered but sometimes their parents sent them.

In 1939, a rule was passed that a person could only stay in the CCC's for two years and many of them wanted to stay longer. Some families would have to split up if the young men had not joined to help get money to buy the necessities of living. I quote one letter in the book "The Forgotten Boys of the CCC who enlisted as Boys but came out Men" - "Looking back, the thing I remember was that we were so God-awful poor. We never had anything and couldn't do anything. My father was a farm laborer with a fifth grade education. There were four children in our family and there was always a crisis. Someone needed a new pair of shoes, a dress, or this or that." This family lived near a railroad track and when the train would slow, the men of the town would jump on it and begin throwing coal off. Later, wives, kids, and grannies would come with coaster wagons and wheelbarrows to pick up the coal. That's how we kept from freezing to death that winter." The year was 1933. "I found myself among 250 poor kids. As I look back, I thought I was the only one who couldn't find a job. The key to CCC was that we were all in the same boat."

Some of the jobs were: blacksmith, forestry, driving heavy equipment, digging ditches, building outhouses for schools, cleaning and leveling playgrounds for schools, building the schools playground equipment, carpentry, building walkways, develop state parks, help farmers in erosion control, string telephone lines, build roads, fighting fires, re-store historical homes, mosquito control and too many others to mention.

The duration of the CCC Program was from April 1933 to June 1942. Many nicknames were given to the Corps such as "Roosevelt's Tree Army", "Tree Troopers", "Soil Soldiers", "CCC's", "Colossal College of Calluses". Total men enrolled 3,463,766 (est.) and non-enrolled personnel: 263,755. Well known actors enrolled in CCC were Raymond Burr and Walter Matthau. Most of the men who served in the CCC's and WPA's have only good things to say about it and the experiences they had - It truly did take scared, hungry and desolate young boys and gave them clothing, food, medical care, a warm place to stay and pay too. These young men were proud to work and send money back to their "folks" in order for them to survive. They all tell of fond memories of these days and keep in touch with each other even after all this time has passed. It improved their lifestyle and lifted them out of the abysmal poverty and gave them self-respect. It was a stepping stone to a better life. Many had no education at all when they entered but came out with at least an 8th grade diploma.

More than three million young men served in the CCC during its 9 1/2 years of existence. The jobs were run by Civilian Supervisors, but everything in camp was run by Military Men. They went through much of the same training as the basic drills in the actual Military. Many would have re-enlisted if they had been permitted to do so.

The CCC lived on for a few months but the end was inevitable. Technically the Corps was never abolished. It was far simpler for Congress just to refuse it any additional money. The House did this in June 1942 by a narrow vote of 158 to 151. The Senate voted twice and then Vice-President Henry **WALLACE**, to break the tie, voted to fund the CCC. It was a valiant effort, but it didn't work. The Senate-House conference committee compromised finished it by concurring in the House action in return for \$8 million to liquidate the agency. The full Senate confirmed the action by voice vote and the Civilian Conservation Corps moved into the pages of history.

Paschall Family Cemetery

For years I have known about a family cemetery located off the Drewry-Ridgeway Road in Warren County, NC. My mother pointed out a group of trees in a field saying that was where her mother was buried. Her mother, Belle Evans Paschall, died from complications giving birth. My mother was only two years old.

A few years ago, an uncle and cousin went with me to the cemetery site. It is located in the middle of a crop field with no real access area. Farm machinery has gradually eroded the outside the cemetery making it impossible to identify the exact area. Due to trees, vines, debris, and foliage, it was hard to tell anything about it. It didn't appear to have any stones or grave markers.

I shared my concerns about the condition of the cemetery with some of my cousins. After viewing the area, they shared my concern in preserving this home cemetery.

The cemetery was established by Robert William Paschall, my great, grandfather. It is on land that his grandfather, William Paschall, acquired by land grants in the mid 1800s. I found a deed that gave some measurements of the cemetery.

Within the last year, we determined that we have to save this cemetery or it will soon disappear. The owner of the land and the person who farms the land were contacted. They had some awareness of the cemetery's existence and we discussed access. We tried to plan a clean up day but didn't have the needed manpower nor equipment. It would be costly to hire someone.

Then a cousin, Lillian F. Davis, called and said two of her grandsons and her son-in-law had offered to clean and clear the cemetery. On April 22, 2005 the Ayscue family worked all day clearing the cemetery. I recorded their activities in photos which I shared with a report at our family reunion on July 4.

We found one headstone and footstone (both broken in half) of a small boy. This was a true identification that this was the true area of the family cemetery. There were several large field stones also found. I have been searching records to verify the other persons buried here. I was sure my great grandparents were there. This was their home place. Robert died in 1908 and his wife, Lucy, died in 1918. I have Lucy's death record.

Other children are buried there. Two of Robert and Lucy's children died in June 1863 – a girl age four and a boy age one. This was when Robert was away serving in the Civil War. My grandmother's remains were moved to New Hope Cemetery near Drewry in the 1950s. This is where her husband, A. E. Paschall, and his second wife are buried.

My goal now is to keep the cemetery clean and find some funds for a fence. I have also sent an application for a CSA tombstone for Robert Paschall. He served in the 43rd Regiment, NC Troops.

Rambling Around

Oxford Public Ledger, January 5, 1926

One of the most embarrassing incidents in my life, as I ruminate, and at the same time one of the most ludicrous, was when I resided in Oxford, in my youthful and "gosling days." Along about that time the late Sheriff William A. **PHILPOTT**, who lived on the southeastern edge of town, had several very attractive daughters. James A. **DAVIS**, of Flat river, a brother of the late W.A. **DAVIS**, of Oxford Torchlight fame, engaged me to take him over to the sheriff's home to meet these young ladies. We went over one evening. It had rained that day, and we wore overshoes, in order to retain the shine upon our patten-leathers. We were cordially met by the younger daughter, who piloted us into the house. In the hallway to the front door we proceeded to take off our overshoes. Facing the front door, in the hall was a door leading into the basement. It seemed, from subsequent events, that this door was not properly latched to make it fast. **Jim DAVIS** backed himself up to this door to steady himself on one foot, while he removed an overshoe from the other. Miss **PHILPOTT** was agreeably entertaining her guests in jolly conversation, when all of a sudden that door flew open and **Jim DAVIS** was swallowed up in the darkness; disappeared like a phantom. All that was left of him upstairs was one overshoe at the entrance. Consternation seized us with horror. **DAVIS** rolled backward down the stairway to a landing like a ball going down a ten-pin alley. We expected to find him injured; but he was on his feet, coming up like a bucket out of a well, when a light was brought and we could penetrate the darkness of the basement. He came up smiling, and apologized for "Falling from (Miss) Grace," and said that he sometimes took off his overshoes in that way – but not often. **Jim** was a witty fellow, and that backward spring did not dim his scintillations. Sunshine and clouds. The sadness overspreading this episode, to me, is the fact that all of the actors connected with it, except myself, have "passed over the river," and they live only in memory. *By Old Hurrygraph*

James **TURNER** was a resident and representative of this county. He was born in Southampton County, Virginia, in the year 1766. His father, Thomas **TURNER**, removed with his family to Bute County (since divided into Franklin and Warren), when this son was quite a youth.

His early education was as good as the state of the county afforded. The elevated positions he was called upon in subsequent life to fill, and the ability with which he discharged his duty, is more to be attributed to his native strength of mind, than to the advantage of education.

Young as he was, he was not an idle or indifferent spectator to the trials of his country in her Revolutionary struggles. He joined, as a private, the army, and served in that humble capacity. In the same company, and in the same capacity, was Nathaniel **MACON**.

He entered public life in 1800 as a member of the House of Commons, and in 1801 and 1802 as Senator, at which session he was elected Governor of the State.

In 1805, he was elected Senator in Congress, and served until 1816.

He was in Congress during a troubled and excited period, and gave the war of 1812 a firm and vigorous support, while his colleague, Gov. **STONE** (see Bertie), differed from him, which conduct of **STONE** received the disapprobation of the General Assembly of the State. He was a man of great personal worth, a faithful representative, and a sincere friend.

He died on the 15th of January 1824, at Bloomsbury, his residence in this county, in the 58th year of his age.

Governor **TURNER** was thrice married; first, to Mary **ANDERSON**, of Warrenton, in 1793, who died in 1802, leaving him four children, Thomas, Daniel, Rebecca, (who married George E. **BADGER**), and Mary. Second, to Mrs. Ann **COCHRAN**, who died in 1806, leaving no issue; and thirdly, to Mrs. Elizabeth **JOHNSON**, who survived him, and who bore him two daughters, Sally P. (wife of Hon. Mark **ALEXANDER**, of Virginia), and Ann (wife of Henry **COLEMAN**, Esq., of Virginia).

His son, Hon. Daniel **TURNER**, was born in Warren County, 26th September, 1796. His early education was conducted at the Warrenton Academy, which he left in 1813 to join the Military Academy at West Point, New York. In 1814 he was promoted to a Lieutenancy of Artillery. He was stationed on Long Island, under General **SWIFT**, who was superintending the lines on Brooklyn Heights for defence of New York City. He was then ordered to Plattsburg, under General **MCCOMB**. The war being over, he was retained on the peace establishment, but he resigned, in September, 1815, his commission.

After leaving the army, he spent two years at William and Mary College, in Virginia.

From 1819 to 1823, he was in the House of Commons, and was elected, from this district, as a member of Congress, from 1827 to 1829. He married in 1829, Anna **ARNOLD**, daughter of

Hon. Francis S. **KEY**, of Washington City, an able lawyer, of distinguished literary attainments, and the author of the "Star Spangled Banner," written during the war of 1812 with England.

Mr. **TURNER** has now charge of the Warrenton Female Seminary.

Governor William **HAWKINS** was a son of Philemon **HAWKINS**, who was the brother of Colonel Benjamin **HAWKINS**, whose biography we have already recorded. He was elected member of the Assembly in 1805, and Speaker of the House of Commons. In 1811, he was elected Governor of the State, and took an active and prominent part for the war. He died in 1812, leaving several children, one of whom married, the second time, Hon. Henry W. **CONNER**, of Catawba County.

General Micajah Thomas **HAWKINS**, who has also been already referred to in the sketch of Colonel Benjamin **HAWKINS**, son of John **HAWKINS**, entered public life in 1819, as a member of the House of Commons, and from 1823 to 1827, as member of the Senate. From 1831 to 1841, he was a member of Congress.

In 1846, he was again elected to the Senate of the Legislature.

Kemp **PLUMMER**, Esq. was born in Gloucester County, Virginia, in 1769; educated at William and Mary College, and read law with Chancellor **WYTHE**. He entered the Legislature in 1794, as a member of the House of Commons, and in 1815 and 1816, was a member of the Senate.

He married Susan **MARTIN**, by whom he has had a large family, one of whom is wife of Hon. William H. **BATTLE**, of Chapel Hill.

Hon. John **HALL**, late of Warren County, was a native of Virginia. He removed early to North Carolina, and was appointed a Judge of the Superior Courts of Law in 1809, and a Judge of the Supreme Court in 1818, which he resigned in 1832, and died soon after. He was distinguished for his patience, learning, and purity of character. He left a large family, among whom is

Hon. Edward **HALL**, now a resident of Warren. He was educated at the University, and graduated in 1815, in the same class with Judge **MANGUM** and Gov. **SPAIGHT**. He studied law, and was appointed Judge in 1840. His commission expired in 1841.

Hon. Blake **BAKER** represented Warren County in the House of Commons in 1807. He was the Attorney-General of the State from 1794 to 1803. In 1808, he was appointed a Judge of the Superior Court, and his commission expired in the same year. He was again appointed in 1818, and died that year.

Hon. William **MILLER**, late of this county, represented it in 1810, in the House of Commons, and in 1811 to 1814, at which session he was elected Governor of the State. He served until 1817. He was appointed by the President of the United States Chargé d' Affaires to Guatemala (Central America), in March, 1825, and died while on this mission.

Hon. Weldon Nathaniel **EDWARDS** was born in 1788, and was educated at the Warrenton Academy. He read law with Judge **HALL** and came to the bar in 1810; succeeded Governor **MILLER** in the House of Commons in 1814; re-elected to the House of Commons in 1815.

In 1816 he was elected to Congress, and served until 1827, when he retired from Congress.

In 1833 he was elected Senator in the Legislature, in which he served continuously until 1844.

In 1835, with the venerable and distinguished Nathaniel **MACON**, he was a delegate from Warren, to amend the Constitution of the State.

In 1850 he was again elected to the Senate, and was chosen to preside over its deliberations; a compliment well deserved, for his long and faithful services in the councils of the State.

Hon. John **BRAGG**, now of Mobile, Alabama, is a native of Warren. He was educated at the University of North Carolina, and graduated in 1824, in a distinguished class, of which James W. **BRYAN**, Thomas **DEWS**, William A. **GRAHAM**, Matthias E. **MANLY**, David **OUTLAW**, and others, were members. He read law with Judge **HALL**, and entered the Legislature in 1830 and served continuously to 1834.

He removed to Mobile, Alabama, and has been Judge of the Superior Courts there for many years; presiding with great credit to himself and satisfaction to the citizens of his adopted State. He is now a member of Congress from the Mobile district.

He is brother of Colonel Braxton **BRAGG**, who with his Artillery saved the battle of Buena Vista, and distinguished himself in the Mexican war; and also brother of Thomas **BRAGG**, Esq., of Jackson, Northampton County, member of the House of Commons in 1842; and now a member of the Board of Internal Improvements of this State.
