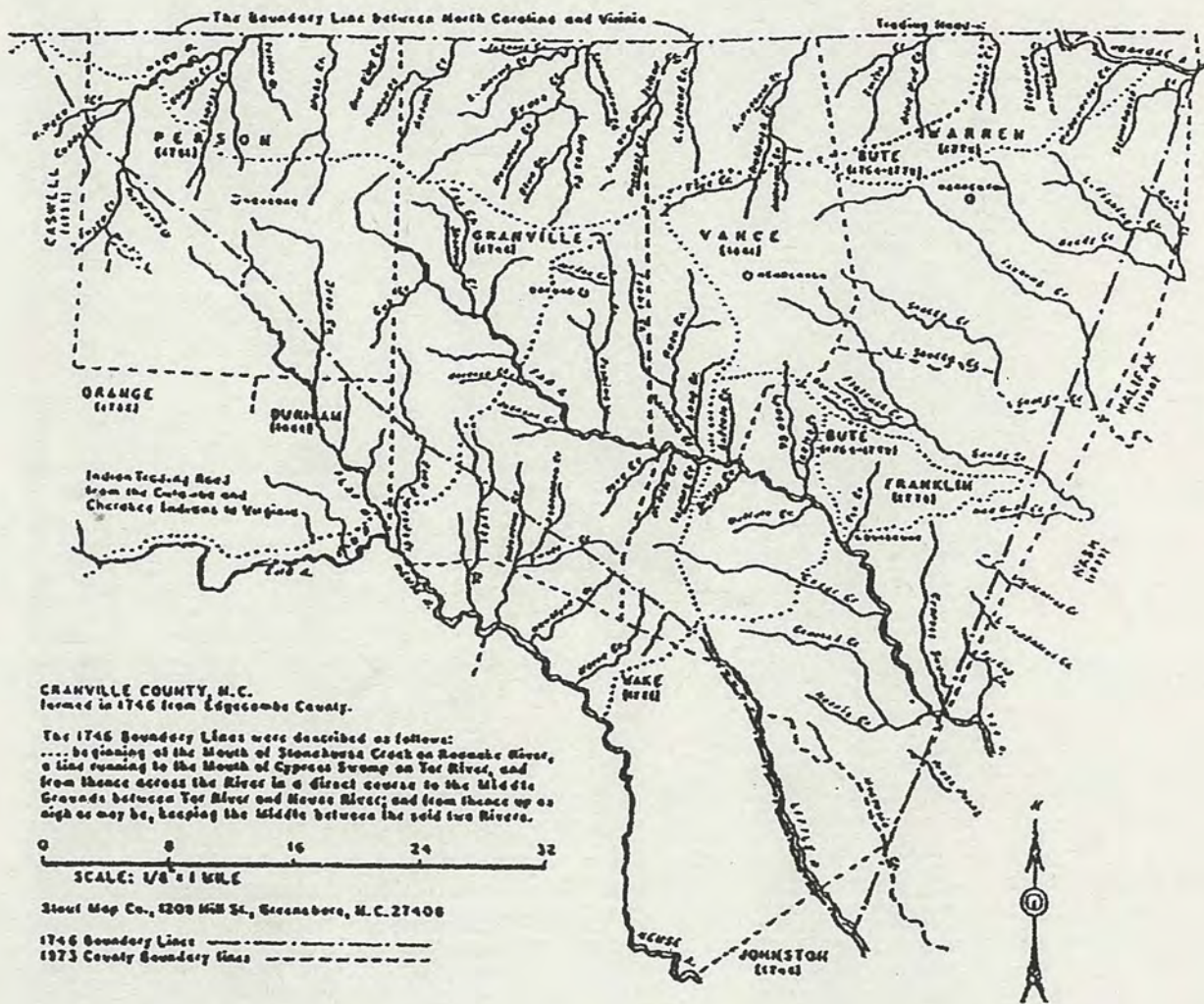


# GRANVILLE CONNECTIONS

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## Election August 7<sup>th</sup> 1845

Abstracted from original on file at NC Archives

A list of voters held at Youngs Store, Granville County, North Carolina .

State of North Carolina, Granville County. We the undersigned having been appointed inspectors of the polls at Youngs Store for a member in Congress and for Clerk of Superior Court and for County Court do hereby certify that they were duly sworn according to law and affirm polls for that purpose and it resulted as follows (viz)

For Congress the Hon John J. R. Daniel received eighteen votes as above stated and that Doct. Bond received thirty votes as stated and for Superior Court Clerk Benjamin C. Cook received ninety eight votes and Elijah Satterwhite received nineteen votes as above and for County Court Clerk James M. Wiggins received eighty eight votes and Charles Barker received thirty one votes as above stated.

Given under our hands and seals this 7<sup>th</sup> of August 1845

For Superior Court, Cook forty eight, Satterwhite eighteen, for County Court Clerk Wiggins forty four, Barker twenty two. Given under our hands and seals this 7<sup>th</sup> day of August 1845.

## Bible Records of Julia Ann Brent and Edwards Chambers Allen

Now in the possession of Mrs W.F. Schmit 306 Delacroix Street Oxford, N. C. 1966. Inherited from her mother Mrs Walter Know Long, deceased.

James Brent was born in Charlotte County, Virginia July 2, 1763. He was the son of John and Margaret Caldwell Brent.

James Brent, who was the father of Julia Ann Brent was married to Ann Patrick in Virginia February 20, 1788.

Their daughter Julia Brent was married to Edward Chambers Allen of Prince Edward County, Virginia on December 17, 1807. They lived in Charlotte County and Prince Edward County, Virginia until 1823 when they removed to Granville County, North Carolina to a place on the Tar River near Corinth, eight miles south of Oxford and the Raleigh Road on which place her daughter Mrs Mary Cordelia Hester now livess this 29<sup>th</sup> day of November 1897.

## The North Carolina Justice Precedents Relating to the Office and Duty of a Justice of the Peace

*By Benjamin Swain 1837  
Abstracted from original copy*

### ESTATES

1. Estates tail are done away; and converted into estates in fee simple.
2. In case of joint tenancy of real or personal estate, the survivor is not entitled to the whole on the death of the cotenant; but the part belonging to the deceased shall descend or be distributed to the representatives of the tenant dying intestate. But where there are partners in trade, and some of them die, the survivor or survivors shall be entitled to the whole for the purpose of winding up concern, paying the debts, &c. and when completed, shall pay or deliver over the proportion to which the deceased would have been entitled, to his heirs, assigns, executors or administrators.
3. Where by deed or will, an estate be limited to take effect on condition that any person die without heirs, issue, children, &c. it shall be understood, unless plainly expressed to the contrary, that the estate is not to vest in the donee or devisee, if an heir, child, or other relation mentioned, be born within ten months after the death happens. But this rule of construction is not to operate on any deed or will made before the 15<sup>th</sup> of January, 1828.
4. In conveyances for use, the possession shall be transferred to the use, *livery of seizen*.
5. The grantee of a reversion shall have the same advantages against the a tenant for life or years that the grantor had.
6. And a tenant for life or years has the same remedy and advantages against the grantee of the reversion that he had against the grantor.
7. Buying or selling pretended rights or titles is prohibited under a penalty of the whole value of the land, one-half to the person suing, and the other half to the County.
8. Warranties of the inheritance by tenants for life are void.
9. Leases for life or years made by husband and wife, of the lands of the wife, require that the wife shall be privily examined according to law, or they have no effect after the death of the husband.
10. And such leases can only be made for three lives, or twenty-one years.
11. Tenants for life are protected against feigned recoveries.
12. Unless the recovery be had on good title.
13. Where assent to a recovery appears of record, it shall be good against the person assenting.
14. "A tremor may falsify for his term recoveries in such wise as a tenant of the freehold may."
15. Terms for years are protected against recoveries.
16. "All persons having lands by execution, (*elegit*) shall have like remedy to falsify recoveries as is provided for lessees for years."

### **It Was the Law in 1839**

Abstracted from The North Carolina Justice

#### **MARRIAGE**

The Clerk of the County Court where the woman resides, on application, is to grant license, first taking bond and security in one thousand dollars (according to the substance of the form given of this chapter).

The publication of bans must be made three Sundays during divine service or immediately after, by a Minister or reader duly qualified; who is to give a certificate of publication when required, and may charge forty cents. Quakers are to retain their own peculiar rites and ceremonies as to marriage

No white person is permitted to marry an Indian, negro, mustee, mulatto, or any person of mixed blood, to the third generation, under a penalty of one hundred dollars, to the use of the county, by judgement of the County Court.

If a man be convicted of marrying an infant female under the age of fifteen, without the consent in writing of her father, who has any estate, the Court is to appoint a trustee to take care of her estate, real and personal, and hold it for her separate use during the coverture; and at the death of the husband, the trustee is to convey it back to her or her representatives. If the wife die before husband, he has no right to administer on her estate.

The trustee is to give bond and security, in such sum as the Court shall direct, payable to the State of North Carolina, for the faithful performance of his trust, and shall be allowed a suitable compensation. The Superior Court may, for sufficient cause, remove the trustee at any time, and appoint another.

## INTERESTING LIFE ENDS

Capt. William Bowling Died at Rougemont Yesterday

NEAR 200 LIVING DESCENDANTS

Life that Stretched Back Nearly to Waterloo and in Days of Napoleon

VOTED AT SAME PRECINCT 59 YEARS

Funeral Will Be Conducted from Red Mountain Baptist Church This Afternoon -  
Burial Near His Old Home Place

Capt. William Bowling, whose life dated back to the stormy period nearly one hundred years ago, died at his home at Rougemont yesterday morning at 11 o'clock. His death had been daily expected for several weeks and the end was no surprise to his many relatives and numerous friends who had been keeping in touch with his condition from day to day. The machinery of his life simply gave away, this alone being the cause of his death.

The funeral will take place from the Red Mountain Baptist church this afternoon at 2 o'clock and the burial will be in the grave yard at that church. The funeral service will be conducted by Rev. Mr. Stradley, of Oxford. The pall and floral bearers will be as follows: Pall bearers - Messrs. E. W. Thacker, W. A. Carver, R. Bowen, Noah Jeffreys, Weldon Hall, John Parker, John W. Rhew and E. Cothran. Floral bearers - Messrs. W. B. Bowen, Cleveland Timberlake, Richard Timberlake, W. D. Bowling, C. A. Anderson, Grover Tilley, Henry Umstead and E. Parrish.

There are many relatives and a great many friends of Capt. Bowling in this city and quite a large number will go out from here today to attend the last sad rites over his remains.

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The life of Capt. William Bowling stretches back to that period that to think of it now seems like old history. He was the son of Willis Bowling and was born in 1817, two years after the battle of Waterloo, and remembered distinctly when he was told of the death of Napoleon Bonaparte, this being when he was a child of 4 years of age. He recalled the time when the settlers of this section were far apart and when there were roving bands of Indians in this section of the country.

He began voting at the election of 1838 and has voted in every general election from that time up to the present, voting at the same place, as he never changed his home place, living all of his long, useful and honored life in the community where yesterday he died. In the beginning of life as a young man he was an old time whig, from the time of the civil war up to 1900 he was a democrat and from 1900 to his death he was a republican.

The father of Capt. Bowling was Willis Bowling, who was born at Bowling's mountain, Granville County, and who lived until 1881, dying at the age of 92 years. His grand father was John Bowling, who was born in Maryland in 1755 and after the revolutionary war, in which he fought, he moved to this part of the country, dying at Bowling's mountain.

Capt. Bowling was twice married. His first wife was Miss Martha Jones - whom he married in 1838 - who lived near Rougemont, and of this union there were eight children, three of whom are now living, as follows: J. G. Bowling, of Greenville, this state; Mrs. A. W. Umstead, of Rougemont, and Mrs. J. H. Holloway, of Gorman.

His second wife was Miss Bettie Tapp, of Orange County, whom he married in 1866, and of this union there are five living children, as follows: Dr. E. H. Bowling, this city; B. P. Bowling, Rougemont; Mrs. S. H. Jones, Greenville; Mrs. J. E. Bowling, Durham, and Miss Corinne Bowling, who lives at the home place.

This family, the descendants now living, is probably the largest in the state. In addition to the eight living children there are eighty grand-children, ninety great-grandchildren, and three great-great-grand-children making a total of almost two hundred descendants now living. Should they all gather at the funeral, and be accompanied by their family connections it would take a large and well appointed hotel to take care of them.

There are two incidents of more than ordinary interest in connection with this family. First, Capt. Bowling lived to see five generations of his family living at one time, and a year or so ago a photograph was taken showing one of each of the five generations. His father, Willis Bowling, lived to see five generations, and his grandmother, the wife of John Bowling, lived to see five generations of her family alive. Second, this family has been represented in every war fought by the United States with the single exception of the Spanish-American war.

Capt. Bowling lived a quiet and temperate life - temperate in all things. "Early to bed and early to rise" was one motto. Living in the quiet of country life, away from the stirring scenes of city strife, his years lengthened until almost the century mark had been reached. He never smoked, never chewed and it was only occasionally that he touched strong drink. His was a remarkable career - remarkable in isolation and quietness - and he lived to see great changes and great progress in the world's history.

### **Salaries and Fees 1839**

Abstracted from The North Carolina Justice

The annual salary of the Governor is 2,000 dollars; each Judge of the Superior Court 2,500; Secretary of State, besides fees 800; Public Treasurer 1,500; Comptroller 1,000; private Secretary to the Governor, beside fees, 300; each Clerk of the Treasury department 500; to be paid on the warrant of the Governor, on the first of April, July, October and January.

The salary of the Adjutant General is 200 dollars, to be paid semi-annually upon the warrant of the Governor.

Each Judge of the Superior Courts of Law and Equity 1,950 dollars; one hundred dollars to be deducted for every certificate of attendance from the Clerk he may fail to produce.

The Attorney General, for every term of Supreme Court, (or, in his absence, the Solicitor General,) 100 dollars, and the Attorney General and Solicitors, besides fees, 20 dollars for every Court they attend, or 40, if the Court holds two weeks.

## OLD WILSON GRAVEYARDS

### Persons Believed Buried in one Knotts Crossroads Cemetery

Directions to Cemetery: From the center of Stovall (intersection of US 15 and Main Street) go east on Main Street which becomes Rockwell Road (SR 1430) for 4.4 miles. Turn right at Hicks Crossroads on the Hicksboro Road (SR 1303) and go 1.4 miles. At this point you are .4 mile from Knotts Crossroads (no sign) where the Hicksboro and Stagecoach Roads cross. At this point on SR 1303 where Little Island Creek flows under the road you can walk west off the paved road for 200 yards to the graveyard on a hill behind an old farm house and storage building in Gus Greene's pasture. Do not confuse this cemetery with the one at the crossroads which is the Samuel P. Wilson Cemetery. (also our kin)

The cemetery described above has been designated (by this author) as the William-Joseph Wilson Cemetery. It may be somewhat older than the Samuel P. Wilson Cemetery. It has only two man-carved gravestones. One of these gravestones marks the grave of Edna Wilson Newman, the sister of Joseph P., James D. and William D. Wilson and the daughter of William Wilson, Sr. The other stone is that of William R. Newman, Edna's son. The authors father told me his grandfather, Joseph P. Wilson was buried here. It appears at least 20 persons were buried here. Gus Green says William R. Newman, in 1920, was the last person buried in this cemetery and as a young boy he was at the burial. He has lived on this farm all his life and agrees at least 20 persons were buried here.

Although the persons buried in this cemetery is speculative, the author (based on research) offers the following list for consideration.

It is possible that James D. and Amy Hester Wilson are buried in this graveyard, but we believe they were buried in the Wilsontown Cemetery. We know William D. Wilson's wife Virginia Ann Toone Wilson Delaney (1832-1902) and William Wilson's second wife Elizabeth Toone Wilson are buried in Arkansas. Edna Wilson Newman's husband Thomas J. Newman was killed in the Civil War and is buried in Richmond, Virginia.

Directions to cemetery: From the center of Stovall (the intersection of US 15 and Main Street) go north on US 15 for .4 mile. Turn right on the Wilsontown Road and go 1.7 miles. Turn right at the home of Jimmy Wilson and go to the end of the road. Park in Clyde Wilson's yard. The cemetery is about 400 yards back of Clyde's house and 50 yards left off a farm road.

This cemetery designated the James D. Wilson Cemetery (by this author) probably is where James D. Wilson and his wife Amy Hester Wilson are buried but their graves are not marked. It is also very likely that Amy's parents George and Elizabeth (Wilson?) Hester are buried here. We are fairly positive the others in this list, including many of the children of James D. and Amy and their spouses, are buried here. Some of the Joseph P. Wilson (James D's brother) family are also buried here.

The lack of a number and a dash (-) in the following list indicates that certain spouses were not buried here and under the relationship column is listed where they were buried. Also, we know James D. Wilson's son William and his wife Artelia Satterwhite Wilson are buried in the Elmwood Cemetery in Oxford and his son Warren and his wife Eugenia Norwood Wilson are buried at Stovall Baptist Church.

### Seat of Government 1839

Abstracted from The North Carolina Justice

The City of Raleigh is to be the seat of Government, and the residence of the Chief Officers of State.

"The Governor, Secretary of State, Treasurer and Comptroller are hereby constituted a board to take charge of and keep in repair the buildings belonging to the State, in the City of Raleigh."

The board is to cause the necessary repairs to the public buildings, &c. at the public expense.

"It shall not be lawful for any person to write or scribble on the walls of the State House, or mark the same with pictures or otherwise, under the penalty of five dollars, recoverable before any Justice of the Peace for the County of Wake, to be recovered by any informer to his own use."

"Should such offense be committed by an infant under the age of twenty-one years, his guardian or parent, as the case may be, shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by this act, to be recovered as above directed."

## Will of George Langford, Warren County, North Carolina 1782

In the Name of God Amen. I George Langford of the State of North Carolina and county of Warren am weak and sick but sound in mind and memory. Praised be to God do make and ordain this my last Will and testament in manner and form following Viz. \_

First and Principally I recommend my soul into the hands of God who gave it, hoping through the meritorious Death of Jesus Christ my Saviour, to receive free pardon for all my sins past and ask for my body to be buried at the discretion of my executors hereafter nominated. \_

Item My will is that I leave all this tract of land whereon I now live to be equally divided among my four sons John, George, Herby and Joel Langford to them and their heirs forever and my will is that my son John Langford to take care of his mother during her natural life. My will further is that if any of my sons should die before they come of age or marriage, then his or their parts to be equally divided among my surviving sons. \_

Item I give to my daughter Delilah one feather bed and furniture to her and her heirs forever. My will further is that after my son Joel arrives to the age of twenty one years then my personal estate to be sold and equally divided among my wife and all my children. I appoint my dear wife and my son John Langford executors of this my last will and testament revoking and annulling and making void all other wills and testaments before made. I witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this first day of September one thousand seven hundred and eighty

## Old-Fashioned Boarding House

The old-fashioned boarding house was as distinctive in the community as the post office or the court house. It had an unique personality and was in every sense a local institution. Not so many years ago there were usually several splendid boarding houses in each town. But today, even in the smaller places, the boarding house has gone down the spout. The long table on which was paraded the vast treasures of smoke house, barnyard, garden and orchard has been supplanted by the sleek, slender-hipped, fashion-plate restaurant. Perhaps, the passing of the boarding house can be chalked up to expediency. Every little town in the State now has its dandified café with blazing lights, mirrors, and quick service. Perhaps, the times demand it.

The old-fashioned boarding house was the product of a more leisurely era. The eating place was a huge room within a home. There were long tables on which every conceivable kind of meat, vegetable and fruit were placed. At twelve o'clock or at six o'clock the lady who ran the boarding house came to the front door and rang her big bell. The sound was more than the quintessence of music and magic. Happy men laid down their hammers, their bolts of cloth, and their pencils to foregather eagerly at the boarding house.

Every meal was closely akin to a Sunday school picnic. There was splendid food, good fellowship, and furtive conversations between chewing and passing dishes. After the meal, when the weather was fair, the male boarders sat on the front porch to smoke and talk. No one ever complained about being hungry. The stuff was there on the long table for you. The only problem confronting the boarder involved which particular meats or vegetables to concentrate on.

The boarding house was the mecca for the local unmarried working men, for the drummers who came to town to sell their wares, and for the out-of-town judges and lawyers who came to the quarterly sessions of the local court. The lawyers might come close to fist fights up in the court room, but when the big bell rang, everyone sat down together and concentrated on eating, on the best of all simple pleasures. There is no record of any altercation when the court had retired to Mrs. Soandso's for dinner or supper.

There is nothing wrong with local cafes and the meals and services they supply. But it does seem a shame for a new generation never to know the unadorned poetry of the boarding house bell and all the bliss of stomach and soul it implied.

## Emergency Classes Teach Aged Students to Sign Their Names

The emergency education program under the WPA has been in progress in Granville since December 11, 1935, with four white and six colored school teachers engaged in the work.

The white teachers are Miss Mary Virginia **HUNT**, project supervisor, Mrs. A.M. **DANIEL**, Mrs. Thomas **JONES** and Carl H. **RAGLAND**. These teachers are engaged in West Oxford in the Lewis school and in private homes.

The colored teachers are Dorothy **ALLEN**, Simon R. **COOK**, Polly **O'DAY**, Ida M. **JOHNSON** and Lucinda **POOL**.

Rufus **BEAVER**, a pupil of Mrs. A.M. **DANIEL**, signed his name last year for the first time in his life. He signed it while he was a member of the Federal Jury at Raleigh. R. W. **GIBSON**, a pupil of Carl **RAGLAND**, also signed his name for the first time a few days ago. Although he is 60 years of age, he is taking much interest in his school work.

The pupils are interested in their work, their teachers report, and most of them are learning rapidly.

However, some of them are handicapped because of the lack of schoolbooks and supplies. Last session the Federal Government furnished these materials to a limited extent, but it has not done it so far this session and there is little prospect of it doing so. Donations to be used in the purchase of books, tablets, composition books, pencils, etc., or anything in kind along this line will be very much appreciated by them. Last session and this year also the teachers have had to pay for coal and lights whenever they used a school building. Mr. D.F. **LANIER** has donated some coal this session. Donations for fuel and lights or anything in kind along this line will be very much appreciated by the teachers.

Mrs. Thos. **JONES** is giving lessons in sewing and cooking. At present her sewing class is finishing work on a bed quilt which they will give to charity. Her cooking class is experimenting with recipes and making a special study of diets and menus. She has a large number of young ladies enrolled and they are being enthusiastic over their work.

Mrs. A.M. **DANIEL** is teaching classes in Practical Education which includes the following books:  
1. Practical English and Effective Speech 2. Essentials of Business English and Business Letters 3. A National Business Speller

This course is especially suitable for girls and boys who have finished high school and also for those who dropped out of school before finishing.

Carl H. **RAGLAND** is teaching classes in Commercial Law and Business Arithmetic. Also he and Mrs. **DANIEL** are teaching classes in Literary Education, which includes Reading, Writing, Spelling, Arithmetic and English for pupils below the third grade.

The pupils pay no tuition for the salaries of teachers are provided for by the WPA Education Program. The teachers will be glad to enroll new pupils any time.

## Today we mourn the passing of a beloved old friend, Mr. Common Sense.

Mr. Sense had been with us for many years. No one knows for sure how old he was since his birth records were long ago lost in bureaucratic red tape.

Common Sense was preceded in death by his parents, Truth and Trust, his wife, Discretion; his daughter, Responsibility; and his son, Reason.

He is survived by two stepbrothers; My Rights and Ima Whiner. Not many attended his funeral because so few realized he was gone.
