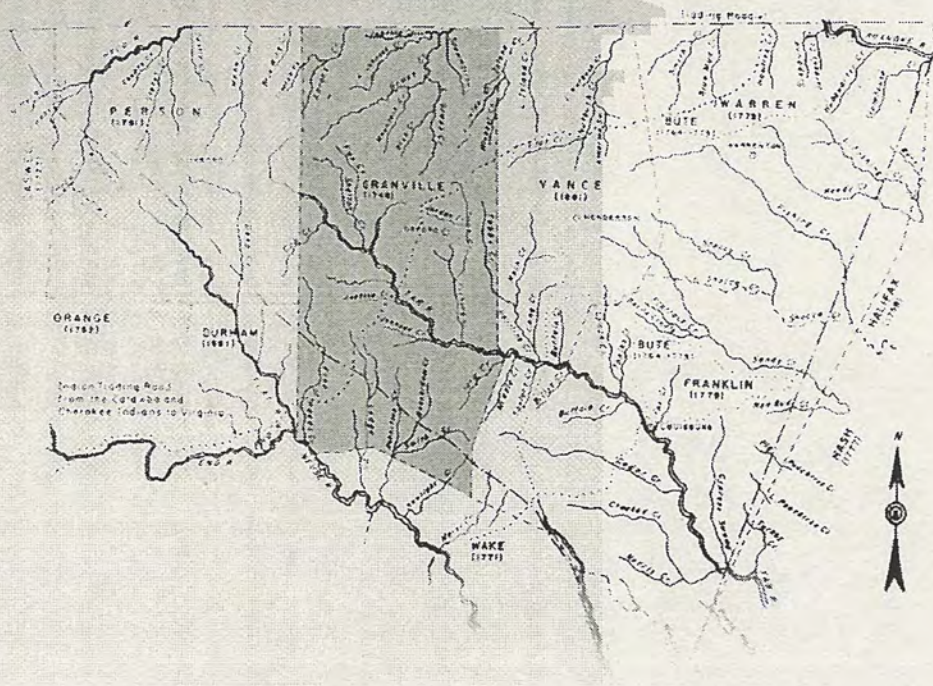

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GRANVILLE CONNECTIONS

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In Memory of Pvt. Wyatt Currin, Co. I, 23rd Regiment, North Carolina Troops

My name is Wyatt Currin. I was born in Granville County, North Carolina in 1829. My parents are Wiatt and Elizabeth Hester Currin. My brothers are James and Thomas and a half brother Ansel. I have two sisters Mary Jane and Elizabeth and four half sisters: Sarah, Susan, Nancy and Mildred.

On the 23rd July 1851 I married Frances Blackwell and we have four children: Jane, Beckie (Rebecca), Nathan and Flem (Edward Fleming). We live in northern Granville County on Grassy Creek where I farm.

On the 28th of November 1863 I was inducted into service at Camp Holmes near my state capital of Raleigh, North Carolina for the duration of the war. After about six weeks of drilling we were sent to a place near Orange Courthouse in Virginia and were placed into Company I of the 23rd Regiment of North Carolina Troops. George Bullock from Granville County is my Captain and there are other men from Granville County and Counties near us in my Company. Captain Bullock has been captured and exchanged at Chancellorsville, Virginia. Our Regiment was in winter quarters near Orange Courthouse from December until February in 1864 then we moved to Taylorsville and spent the rest of the winter there.

The 23rd is part of Johnson's Brigade. We fought at the Wilderness and there is where I first saw the elephant. It was assigned to D. H. Hill's Division. They had fought at The Seven Days, Seven Pines, Mechanicsville, Cold Harbor, Gaines's Mill, Fox's Gap, Sharpsburg and Fredericksburg and with Jackson's 2nd Corps at Chancellorsville, Gettysburg and Mine Run.

On the 7th of May we marched toward Spotsylvania Courthouse to support Rodes' Division. We heard it was a race with Meade to get between us and Richmond. We got there first on the 8th of May. By the time our Regiment got there it was already dark and so foggy. It took us most of the night to get into position. By morning we had formed the front part of a salient. Small trees were cut down and laid length wide upon each other to form a breastwork about four feet high. Then we dug a ditch and threw the dirt against the logs. Some of the trees and limbs we cut and sharpened into spikes to fix as abatis in front of the breastwork.

On the 10th of May the enemy made an assault on the works and broke through. There was fierce fighting but they were finally driven back. By the next day we could tell they were building up for another try of us. A cold rain was falling all night and thick fog made it hard to make out anything. It was hard to keep our powder dry. When they charged us some of the muskets would not fire.

I was captured along with several more of my Company and taken to Point Lookout, Maryland. I stayed there until the 10th of August. Conditions there were bad, food was so scarce and many were dying with runs. I saw men that I knew from Granville County that were in other Companies and Regiments while I was in Point Lookout Prison. Some of them died while I was

there. We did not have any way to let our families know when someone died or was sick. When the new prisoners come in we get news of the battles and from our families and neighbors. In July they began taking some of us to Elmira, New York. A train carrying about five hundred Confederates and the Federal guards was wrecked at Shohola, Pennsylvania . Many were killed outright and many more injured. I heard more about it after I came here. In August, I was brought here to Elmira Prison along with about four hundred more men. Major Henry Colt is the commander of this camp. For discipline he sometimes orders prisoners to wear pork barrel shirts. The bottom is kicked out of a barrel and a round hole cut in the other end. It was pulled over the man's head and he has to parade around in it for a certain amount of time. Something that will get the shirt for you is, killing and eating a cat or dog and stealing food. Some of the men caught, cooked and ate the dog that was coming in with the man that baked bread. They said it tasted like mutton. I am often very hungry but have not eaten rats or dogs.

The cold weather, poor clothing, lack of shoes and little or no medicine is taking a terrible toll. The food allowance has been reduced again. We have been living in tents until recently. The weather is the coldest winter on record. We have finished some barracks and moved in. There is a stove at each end of the barrack and we can have a fire at nine in the morning and again at nine at night. We are allowed only three or four sticks of wood at a time. There are still a few men in tents with only one blanket each. We have just one blanket each but we are in bunks. We get two meals a day. In the mornings, we get a slice of bread and a small piece of salt pork. In the evenings we get a slice of bread and a tin cup of watery bean soup.

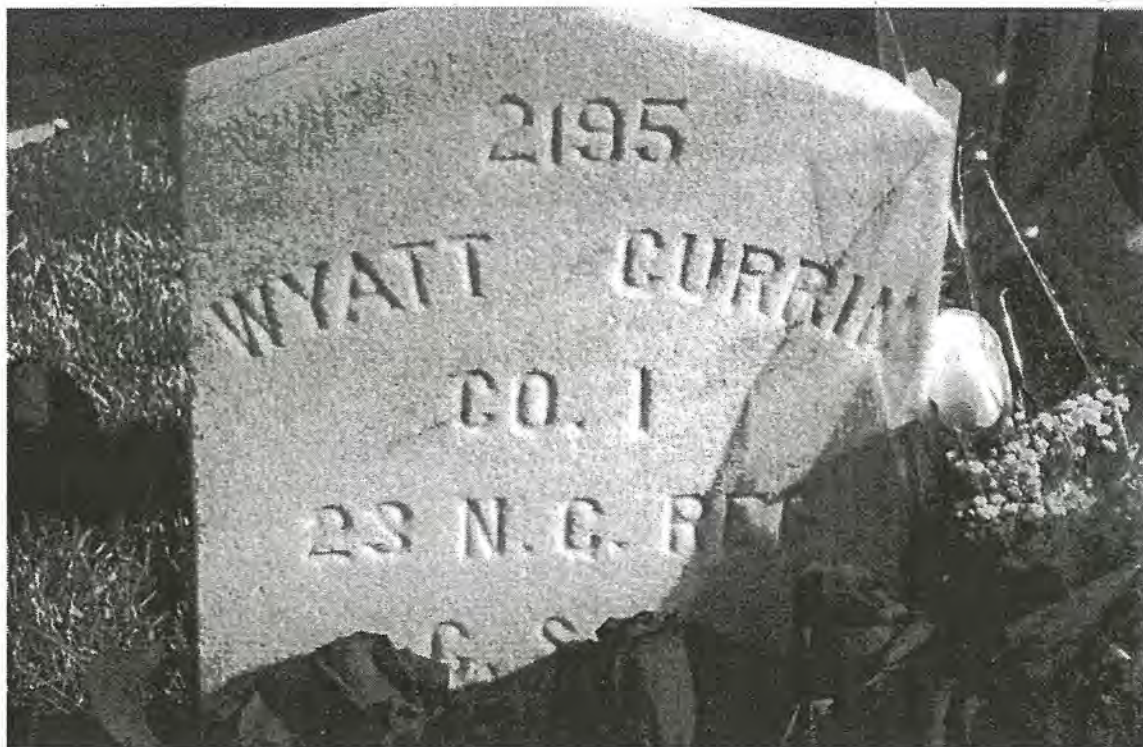
There is a stagnant pond inside the pen that gets worse ever day with the sinks getting into it. I hear they are going to get it connected to the river so it can drain, however this has not been done yet. It is filled with filth. The hospital quarters for those of us that have smallpox and are dying are now located between this pond and the river. Some men came in October from Mobile with smallpox. It started spreading so fast they started putting them in tents over across the pond and called it the smallpox hospital. Marcus Toney told me that when he got it he went over there. He said he did not see a doctor while he was there. Once a day, a waiter comes with some bread and tea for those with smallpox. We are so crowded for tent space that some of us are on one side of this little pond and the sick and dying are on the other side. We cannot help but catch smallpox so close together. Ten or twelve skin and bones men are taken to the death house every day. Some of the men are put to work making coffins. They cannot make them fast enough. When a man dies, they drag him out in front of the tents and leave him there till he freezes in whatever shape death found him.

Some of us have our feet to freeze standing out in the snow for roll call. We had eighteen inches fall last week. Last fall someone put up two observation scaffolds outside the pen. People from Elmira would pay to come up and watch us.

I heard they sold refreshments like ice cream and lemonade for 10 or 15 cents to them while they watched us. After some citizens started throwing food over the walls to us. They have taken the scaffolds down now.

We do not hear any news from outside. There is just one thing on our minds: survive until

it is over and we can go home to the one we hold so dear. My hearts desire is once again be in Granville County, North Carolina at Grassy Creek with my wife, children and all of my family and neighbors.

Wyatt Currin died of smallpox in Elmira Prison on 15 February 1865. He is buried in the Confederate part of Woodlawn Cemetery in Elmira, New York along side the other brave men from the South that fought for the cause. Robert Taylor Neathery and John Henry Knott from Granville County died in Elmira and are buried with him. Benjamin Person Thorp from Granville County was also in Elmira and lived to return home to Granville County. Wyatt had a nephew, Alexander Currin, the son of his sister and her husband Jacob Currin of Warren County, North Carolina also imprisoned while he was in Elmira. Alexander lived to return home and let the family know that Wyatt had died.

Mr John Sprunt Hill Decides on Creedmoor Route for the Hard Surface Road, Durham-Oxford

Recommends Maintenance of the Stem Route as a Detour During Construction of the Creedmoor Road.

The best piece of news received in Creedmoor and southern Granville for many years was that Saturday afternoon when the announcement was made that Mr John Sprunt Hill, highway commissioner of the Fourth district, had recommended the location of the proposed hard surface highway from Durham to Oxford over the southern, or Creedmoor route.

The matter of locating the road has been agitated since last October. Influential citizens on the route between Oxford and Durham on the Creedmoor route have worked unceasingly for the road, but no unfair means have been resorted to in the matter. It has been the opinion of many all along through the fight for the location of the road, that it would be located by this route, from the simple fact that all the logic that could be thought of favored it.

The fight is not ended by any means; the advocates of the Stem route will appeal from Mr Hill's decision to the full board of highway commissioners, to be held in Raleigh on Friday June 29. It is believed by all that the decision of Mr Hill will be approved by the body of highway commissioners, but it might be well for all of those who have fought so valiantly for its routing by Creedmoor, to attend the meeting Friday and see that no unfair means are brought to bear upon the body.

We have before us the report of Mr Hill and his decision on the location of the road. He goes into the matter thoroughly and bases his decision on the best interest of the State of North Carolina and the road will serve. In closing his report Mr Hill says:

"It is my decision, therefore after long and patient and careful consideration of this important controversy, that the best interests of the State of North Carolina and the best interests of the people of Granville, Franklin, Wake, and Durham counties require the highway connecting Oxford, the county seat of Granville county with Durham, the county seat of Durham county, to be permanently located by the southern or Creedmoor route; and that I recommend that pending the construction of the new hard surface road, via Creedmoor, the State highway commission continue the maintenance of the road by Stem as a detour.

Editor note: This is present day US Highway #15 which goes through Creedmoor. A well built road.

A nine days old baby talks, dies

A special from Roanoke, VA says:

The Fox post office neighborhood of Grayson county, is in a state of excitement and perplexity as a result of the prodigious performances of a nine-day-old child, the baby of Mr. & Mrs Leftwich Brewer, well-known people of that section. W. E. Daniel, a traveling man of Chilhowie, VA, who has just returned from the place, bringing the news of the consternation caused by the baby talking perfectly, and Dr. G. B. Halsey, a reputable physician of Bridle Creek, near Fox post office, has corroborated the story. Dr. Halsey furnished the following data, which is unimpeachable.

Mrs Bell Brewer, wife of Leftwich Brewer, a thrifty farmer living near the North Carolina Line, and whose post office address is

Fox, VA, two weeks ago gave birth to a normally developed boy baby. The little fellow thrived like any healthy newcomer, and its mother progressed to the road of recovery without any backset.

SUDDENLY BEGAN TALKING

When the child was nine days old, Thomas Brewer, a brother of Leftwich Brewer, together with his wife and other neighbors and relatives, went to visit the home in which the stork had come so recently, paod a call. While Mrs Thomas Brewer was holding the baby in her arms calling it endearing names and congratulating the proud parents on the splendid specimen, the little one suddenly began talking. It called the names of its parents, and grandparents and of other relatives present, following each name with the word "heaven" the articulation being perfect.

This monstrous behavior on the part of the nine day babe so excited and scared the party that the number of persons fled from the house in dismay, believing something terrible was about to take place.

PEOPLE GREATLY EXCITED

Every word spoken by the child was repeated three times and thi only served to intensify the spell cast over those who heard the voice. News of the marvelous actions of the latest arrival in the Brewer home spread through the vicinity like wildfire and threw the section into a state of perturbation.

The child died yesterday and the excitement has somewhat subsided, but the people are yet in a maze of wonderment, having never heard of anything like what has happened in their midst, and many are said to be living in fear and trembling lest the child's death will be followed by some terrible catastrophe.

The foregoing is the text of a newspaper clipping found in the papers of Roby Young of the Mouth of Wilson. There was no dat on the clipping. Dr Green B. Halsey, b 3/12/1863, d 4/3/1908.

Granville never lost a better or worthier citizen than Mr. Hester was. He owned and occupied one of the prettiest places in all our section of the country. He was eminently successful and industrious as a farmer, and at the time of his death was one of the leading and largest bright leaf growers in our county. His premises in the way of barns, house, etc., have smartly the appearance of a village. It was here that he dispensed his bountiful hospitality of which so many have partaken. In the face of all our recent vicissitudes he kept prospering and was able to live after the old fashioned style. Keeping good horses and enjoying the fox hunt, with high bred fox hounds. No man had a kinder or more sympathetic heart or bent more readily to a story of sorrow or complaint. He won invariable the implicit confidence and esteem of those with whom he dealt. And this will be sad and painful news, to all those around him, and many an eye will be dimmed with tears of genuine sorrow when learning of the death of so good a friend and neighbor.

He had never recovered from the shock occasioned by the death of his model boy, Bennett, and "did not care to live". A large concourse of friends and neighbors followed his remains to the Oxford Cemetery where now father and son side by side rest in peaceful slumber. To those now bowed in grief "The Torchlight" extends its sincere sympathy.

Mr. Perry begins his book with the genealogy of his father, John Wesley Perry, Jr.; born in Granville County, North Carolina; on May 4, 1868; in Dutchville Township; near what is now Creedmoor; the son of John Wesley Perry, Sr., and Sarah F. Mitchell, who were married September 15, 1865 (Marriage Bond in Granville County Court House #4484). John Wesley Perry, Sr., was the son of Solomon Perry, Jr., and his wife Catherine Beck. Solomon Perry, Jr., was the son of Solomon Perry, Sr., who died in Granville County, North Carolina; and left a will dated February 15, 1843

(Will Book No. 15, Page 414); in which he mentions his beloved wife "Rodey." A John Perry whose will is dated March 15, 1796, is recorded in Franklin County Courthouse; Will Book A, lists his children, which included a Solomon Perry.
